Guerrilla Girls: Is it even worse in Europe?

01 October - 5 March 2017

Guerrilla Girls is a group of anonymous feminist activists. They wear gorilla masks in public to conceal their real identities and each member takes as a pseudonym the name of a woman artist from the past.

Their first action was a response to the large-scale exhibition, International Survey of Recent Painting and Sculpture (1984) at the Museum of Modern Art (MoMA), New York. This was the inaugural show in MoMA's newly renovated building, and was planned as a survey of the most important contemporary artists in the world. Of the 182 artists included in the exhibition, only 13 were female, alongside 169 male artists.

Since that time they have been campaigning and highlighting sexism and racism in visual art, film, politics and culture at large.

In this new commission, the Guerrilla Girls revisit their 1986 poster which states "It's Even Worse in Europe". Characteristically deploying their strategic combination of humour, information, bold graphics and a subversive use of public space, they have produced a new campaign, including a banner for the façade of the Gallery, exploring the question of diversity in European art organisations.

This project is based on responses to detailed questionnaires sent to over 400 directors of art museums and public galleries across Europe about their exhibitions programme and collections. The questions had been formulated to critically look at the narratives that are produced by cultural institutions.

Through this extensive project, the Guerrilla Girls present new statistics on the state of museums and galleries in Europe and explore the question: Is it even worse in Europe?

What is the biggest challenge your museum faces today?

One hundred years from now, will a visitor to your institution be able to say "Wow, they got it right!"?
