**Emily Jacir: Europa** 

From 30 September 2015 until 3 January 2016

Galleries 1, 8 & 9 (Victor Petitgas Gallery)

The works in Emily Jacir's exhibition are 'gifts of thought to Europe from an intimate stranger.'1 Poetic and political, her work investigates movement, questions of translation, resistance, and silenced historical narratives. This first UK survey focuses on Jacir's work in Europe, especially Italy and the Mediterranean where she lives.

Highlights include her atmospheric film installation Lydda Airport (2009), set in the 1930s and inspired by a story told to the artist by Salim Tamari whose father recounted waiting at the airport (now known as Ben Gurion) to greet and welcome aviator Amelia Earhart who never arrived.

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Awarded a Golden Lion at the 2007 Venice Biennale, Material for a film (2004–ongoing) is a large- scale, immersive installation based on the life of Palestinian writer Wael Zuaiter who was assassinated in Rome by Israeli Mossad agents in 1972. Episodes of Zuaiter's life are imagined through family photographs, correspondence and documents unearthed by Jacir.

These works are presented alongside landmark pieces including ENTRY DENIED (a concert in Jerusalem) (2003), stazione (2008–2009), and ex libris (2010–2012).

The computer is a ubiquitous component in today's music studios and on stage. Using sound, text and image, the new collaboration between Glasgow-based artist filmmaker Luke Fowler (b. 1978) and Yorkshire-based multidisciplinary artist Mark Fell (b. 1966) examines the development of early computer music languages that have been obscured by more commercially viable options.

The exhibition looks at how the use of computers began to shape music-making through experimentation with unfamiliar techniques involving mathematical structures, data and unusual forms of interaction. These methods are buried deep in the archaeological sub strata of today's electronic music. Working across visual arts and music, the display becomes a tool for local students to experiment with computer-based composition. Free entry

# **Project**

#### Music for Museums

17 September 2015 – 29 November 2015

## Gallery 2

From compositions of the faintest possible sounds emitted by instruments, human bodies or electronic apparatuses, to music derived from mathematical systems and works featuring the feedback of electric guitars, Music for Museums explores the intersection of visual art and experimental music.

This season of live music and film has its roots in the 1960s when museums became a site of experimentation and collaboration between artists and musicians in contrast to the more conservative concert halls. It features a series of live performances, a film programme, and audio interventions in the public areas of the gallery by the collaborative project Support Structure.

Live music performances, on Thursday evenings and Saturday afternoons, feature works by groundbreaking avant-garde composers and artists from the Fluxus and Minimalist generation to contemporary compositions and improvisations by electronic and experimental artists and musicians such as Florian Hecker, Hassan Khan, and Carsten Nicolai and Ryoji Ikeda. A free programme of film screenings focuses on the dynamic relationship between moving image and music with works by Cory Arcangel, Sonia Boyce, Beatrice Gibson, Ken Jacobs, Mikhail Karikis and Uriel Orlow, Tony Oursler, Nam June Paik, Jayne Parker, Elizabeth Price, and others.

**Barjeel Art Foundation Collection: Part 1** 

8 September – 6 December 2015

Gallery 7

Over the next year, the Gallery presents the largest exhibition of modern and contemporary art from the Arab world in Britain. This exhibition in four parts highlights works rarely seen in the UK, from the Barjeel Art Foundation's rich collection. Artists from Algeria, Egypt, Iraq, Lebanon, Palestine and elsewhere in the region tell the story of Arab art from the modern to the contemporary.

This first chapter considers the emergence of a Pan-Arab aesthetic from the early 1900s to 1968. Over 40 densely grouped works reference the early artist salons in the region. Highlights include a portrait of a young woman by Armenian-Egyptian artist Ervand Demerdjian, one of the earliest works in the collection, and Kadhim Hayder's 1965 symbolic painting of white horses.

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Works by Shakir Hassan Al Said, founder of Iraq's Baghdad Modern Art Group, are shown alongside early paintings by the legendary Iraqi-British artist Dia Azzawi and painter Marwan's self-portrait *The Husband* (1966), made during his early years in Berlin, before becoming a key figure in the New Figuration Movement.

### **Archive**

Intellectual Barbarians: The Kindred of Kibbo Kift

10 October 2015 - 13 March 2016

Pat Matthews Gallery (Gallery 4)

The English organisation The Kibbo Kift Kindred (1920–1932) was formed by the artist, writer and pacifist John Hargrave after becoming disillusioned with the Boy Scout movement. Their philosophy was based on a shared appreciation of nature and handicraft, as well as a commitment to world peace. Though small in number, the group's notable members included suffragettes, scientists and the novelist H.G.Wells. Unusually for the time, it was open to every age and gender.

A 1929 exhibition at the Whitechapel Gallery was a way of spreading their ideas, and this archive display reveals their remarkable aesthetic drawn from ancient Egyptian, Anglo-Saxon, Celtic and Native American crafts, dress and language.

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Previously unseen woodcarvings, furniture, ceremonial dress designs and photographs of the Kibbo Kift on parades and camping trips present a forgotten moment in British social movement, offering a futuristic vision which still resonates today. #### Zilkha Auditorium

This season of artists' film from around the world includes Diego Tonus' (Italy) Speculative Speeches (Workers of the World – Relax) (2012), based on conversations recorded by the artist exploring how the voice is used in teaching, business and politics to influence an audience. While Lee Kai Chung's (Hong Kong) The History of Riot (The DJ) (2013), refers to the 1967 riots in Hong Kong and the assassination of anticommunist radio commentator Lam Bun.

Srdjan Keca's (Serbia) Museum of the Revolution (2014) records the derelict state of the Belgrade museum built as a symbol of socialist Yugoslavia and its abandoned underground spaces which are now home to an alternative community. Piotr Wysocki & Dominik Jałowinski's (Poland) Run Free (2011) documents a workshop that the artists organised with policemen and young men in Radom, Poland.

By re-enacting a 1976 workers riot, the artists encouraged the warring groups to collaborate, inviting them to choreograph a routine based on police tactics and free running.

Yama Rahimi's (Afghanistan) Creation Song (2014) juxtaposes footage of a cemetery with images of a stonemason chiselling headstones and explores rituals of mourning, burial and renewal. Free entry
