Home: Live > In Room

Whitechapel Gallery's Youth collective, **Duchamp &** Sons, presents an exhibition curated online with artworks selected from the Hiscox Collection. Home. How do we imagine a space where we have spent so much time over the past months? What does it mean to curate an exhibition from our kitchens and bedrooms, with our laptops and screens? For this project, we met online over a two-month period working in groups and individually to select and discuss artworks. A series of workshops with creative professionals enabled us to gain an understanding of the curatorial process. Through writing sessions we deconstructed the notion of home and its significance to us. This exhibition develops across two rooms: one explores ideas of home as a place of confinement and introspection; the other seeks to map home as a space where we project our fantasies and fragmented thoughts. The soundtrack features our writings about each work on display.

Lockdown has raised questions about the suffocating nature of confinement. However, working from home meant that we had our own space to think creatively. We could switch off mics and cameras for periods of time. Taking turns to speak, we listened to each other and shared our writings, thoughts, and doubts. You are invited to experience a darker, violently real home, and a dreamlike, imagined home drawn from our lived realities. These are captured through a collection of personal stories, voices and images.
